League Zoom Meeting Dr. Wade Jeffrey February, 2021 10:15 Coffee 10:30 Program

r. Wade Jeffrey is a Distinguished University Professor, Director of the Center for Environmental Diagnostics and Bioremediation and Director of the Reubin O'D. Askew Institute of Multidisciplinary

Studies. He trained as an oceanographer with a specialization in marine microbial ecology. For most of his career he focused on how ultraviolet radiation (UV) affects marine microbes.

Since UV is almost everywhere, Jeffery's lab has worked from the Arctic to Antarctic oceans, coral reefs, mountain lakes, the Mediterranean Sea, and our backyard in the Gulf of Mexico. More recently Jeffrey has begun to investigate the extreme environments found in the Atacama Desert in Chile.

Jeffrey's approach combines aspects of microbiology, oceanography, molecular biology and photobiology. Since 2010 he has also been heavily involved with research associated with the Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

Jerffery has done extensive work on the microbial diversity of the northeast Gulf of Mexico and how it is affected by oil. His current work focuses on how environmental parameters (for example sunlight, temperature, salinity) interacts with oil to change its toxicity to marine microbes. Most recently, he has completed two trips to Antarctica to study the microbial ecology of mixotrophic phytoplankton. These unique organisms make their living as both plants and animals.

The League's Position *Statement of Position on Climate Change Policy*, (January 2019): The League believes that climate change is a serious threat facing our nation and our planet. The League believes that an interrelated approach to combating climate change—including through energy conservation, air pollution controls, building resilience, and promotion of renewable resources—is necessary to protect public health and defend the overall integrity of the global ecosystem. The League supports climate goals and policies that are consistent with the best available climate science and that will ensure a stable climate system for future generations. Individuals, communities, and governments must continue to address this issue, while considering the ramifications of their decision, at all levels—local, state, regional, national, and global.

League History In the later 2000s, LWVUS significantly increased its advocacy concerning global climate change. LWVUS believes that climate change is a serious problem that requires immediate domestic and international action. The League believes the U.S. government should move ahead immediately, without waiting for other nations, on initiatives to reduce emissions of heat-trapping gases like carbon, methane, and other air toxins. One of the most important round the clock activities for the LWV is registering eligible voters. We hope

that the restrictions on COVID 19 will be under management by the summer and we can return to face to face recruitment of voters. We participate in this activity by having a table or tent at local festivals, speaking to community organizations and working with students in the public schools. In order for our members to volunteer, they must have completed this training and scored 100 % on the quiz.

Our previous LWVFL Voter Registration quiz officially expired on Dec 31, 2020. A new quiz is available for League members who wish to participate in League voter registration efforts. Please take the new quiz at your earliest convenience.

A grace period of validity for those who are actively registering voters will be in effect until March 1, 2021. If you have not taken the new quiz by March 1st, you will no longer be permitted to register voters under the League's purview.

Once taken and passed, you are re-certified to register voters with LWVFL through December 31, 2022. The quiz, hosted on a new platform, is found on our website and can be found by clicking below.

VOTER SERVICE AND LEAGUE PROGRAM

Sometimes it is difficult to understand exactly how the League of Women Voters takes action on some issues but not others. When the League of Women Voters was organized in 1920, the goal was to teach women about voting. That was the sole focus of the organization. Over the years it became evident there were other governmental issues that needed study and action. Thus the League became two-pronged, with Voter Service as one segment and League Program as the other focus.

Voter Service functions on voter education, including registering voters, providing educational materials to voters and educating the public about our system of government. Sometimes it includes classroom information on the structure of our Democratic Republic form of government. The League also provides non-partisan information on issues the voter will need to consider before casting a ballot..

League Program, on the other hand, involves the objective study of issues of public concern. This is accomplished at all three levels of the League through formation of a committee, unbiased study and presentation to League members for discussion and final determination through a process called consensus. At this point the League can take action, whether in support or opposition, on a governmental issue. The League does not take action on all public concerns, only those on which a position has been reached. \heartsuit

Help Us Keep Track of What Our Local Governments Are Doing!

In the past, the League had an Observer Corps, where members attended County Commission and City Council meetings to keep up to date on the actions of these two governmental bodies. The League representative wore an identifying badge to remind these elected officials that the public was watching and interested in their actions. If an issue of concern was discussed and reported to the League, an appropriate response was taken.

At the present time, meetings are held either on-line or they can be watched on television.

We would like very much to re-institute this program in Escambia and include Santa Rosa County governmental bodies in this project, along with the School Board meetings in both counties. We would also like the observer to report observations of these meetings to the Board.

Solar Tax Credit Extended

n December 2020, Congress passed a massive federal budget bill that included, "a

two-year extension of the *Investment Tax Credit* for solar power, a one-year extension of the Production Tax Credit for wind power projects, and an extension through 2025 for offshore wind tax credits — a significant last-minute boost for clean energy industries." This of course is wonderful news for those wanting to go solar. So, what does it mean? Here is a little bit of history: The Investment Tax Credit was created in 2005, which gave taxpayers a 30% tax credit for home solar installation. The credit was extended annually or bi-annually until 2015 when a long-term extension was implemented with a phase down of dropping to 26% in 2020, 22% in 2021 and down to zero after 2021. The Investment Tax Credit was set to expire this year!

With the passage of the budget bill, however, homeowners who go solar in 2021 or 2022 will be eligible for a 26% tax credit. Homeowners who invest in solar in 2023 will be eligible for a 22% tax credit. The credit expires after 2023 (except for large-scale solar projects and to zero percent for small scale solar projects in 2024 it will fall to 10%).

Education/Juvenile Justice Committee Report

atti Hightower, Escambia County School Board member and Linda Sanborn, Santa Rosa School Board member, met with the League Education/Juvenile Justice committee to discuss various issues of concern. The Governor's allocation for salary increases for newer teachers has created a struggle to make salaries fairer for more experienced teachers.

The two women discussed measures taken in response to the COVID19 pandemic, with some children attending in the physical buildings and others remotely. Ms Sanborn does not believe the disruption from the pandemic will affect graduation rates. However, both board members acknowledged the children in Exceptional Student Education (ESE) may have been more adversely affected. Teacher have been trained to use the remote platforms and, In both counties, these students have been able to access the internet. Each county has implemented various programs to address the problems students may have due to stresses outside of school. This League committee plans to study the use of these programs to determine how effective they are in addressing the needs of students.

Ms. Hightower reported she had attended a meeting with Gulf Power and Cox to discuss increased internet connectivity. She suggested this might be an area where the League could prove helpful. In both counties, the unprecedented disruption has been a time when both districts have been inventive and may find some of the skills learned will be useful even after the pandemic. They reported the Governor has said there will be greater leniency in the requiring of certain student tests..

When questioned about the use of law enforcement in the schools, both guests were complementary of the performance of the school resource officers. They were aware that special training was provided to the officers by both sheriff's departments, but did not indicate if it was a requirement in either school district. With the commitment by the incoming Escambia County Sheriff to use alternatives to arrest through civil citations, League members are hopeful student arrest rates in Escambia County Schools will fall.

Each of the two counties has implemented various programs designed to address problems that students may have due to stresses outside of school. The committee is planning to study the use of these programs to find how effective they are. We will be meeting with the two superintendents of schools to coordinate the study. \heartsuit
